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



### May Drive Redux

Re•dux,/rç'deks,'rç'deks/, adjective, brought back; revived. This is about as apt a description of the May 25th drive I could come up with. After checking and rechecking the forecast for the drive originally scheduled for May 18th, I needed to inform the restaurant the Thursday before if we were going to go ahead. Unfortunately, the forecast was showing heavy rain in the area right at the time we would be having out outdoor lunch. In addition, part of the route would have needed changing due to low water crossings closed from the previous storms. Taking all of that into consideration, the safest decision was to reschedule the drive.

I was feeling bad about the cancellation, especially since several people had helped in pulling all of this together. When Monday rolled around, and the forecast for Memorial Day weekend looked good, the idea of reviving the May drive occurred to me. The idea was floated on the Tejas Chapter Facebook page and the positive responses prompted me to go ahead and plan another drive.

After a little bit of research, I decided LaGrange was somewhere we hadn't been in a while and was close enough to reach in a couple of hours. So, off to Google maps I went. I've written before about planning these drives and the process typically involves picking the roads, driving them, and then making the necessary adjustments. Because I was making plans on Monday for a Saturday drive, testing the route wasn't possible. This resulted in some highs and some lows

along the way. More about that later. We met in the Tech Ridge HEB parking lot, spent some time admiring Gene Janulis' M850i and headed out for LaGrange around 9am. We had a very small group of 7 people in 4 cars but that also meant there wasn't much chance of the trailing car losing sight of the leader.



Sometimes, you pick a road blindly and it's like hitting the jackpot. Our route between Elgin and Bastrop was kind of like that. We turned off 1704 onto Arbuckle Road and followed that to Sayers Road. Let me tell you, from where we picked up Sayers Road to where we hit 95, the road was just beautiful. It definitely wasn't a fast drive. The road was narrow and twisty but there were several places where the trees created an arch across the road and when the light was shining through the canopy, it was beautiful.



However, there were a couple of moments that were surprising.

Because of the recent rains there was some sand in the road. When coming around one particular corner, the front wheels dug in a little, the back end broke loose and there was a bit of unintended rotation. A nudge on the gas and a flick of the wheel and off we went. Shortly after, a low-hanging vine grabbed my magnetic antenna and pulled it off the roof. It sounded horrible from inside the car but everything was fine.

We made our stop at Buc-ees and then proceeded on towards LaGrange. Remember the lows I spoke about that can occur when not being able to drive the route? This part of the drive is where things went a little off.

Part of our route took us on Gotier Trace Road, which seemed like a good idea on Google Maps. Unfortunately, about a mile in, the road went from pavement to dirt. This wasn't planned but I thought it would be just a short stretch and then it would be over. Boy was I wrong. The surface deteriorated from dirt, to dirt and stone, to dirt and rocks. Kathy says I was miserable for the complete three miles. I was really feeling sorry for the other three cars



that were enveloped in the cloud of dust I raised.

Once we cleared to off-road portion, it was on to LaGrange where we had lunch at the Backyard BBQ & Grill. Once done, everyone headed out on their own for their drive back home.

#### **Event Review**

In case you missed it, early in 2019 XPEL was named the official window tint & paint protection film provider of the BMW CCA. Chris



White, General Manager for XPEL of the Austin & San Antonio locations contacted me that he'd like to host an event for the Tejas chapter. This was a prime opportunity to reach out to the local CCA chapter and educate us about their products, automotive & beyond.

We had a great turnout of local & Austin folks with about 45 folks attending the event. We expected good representation from San Antonio, but it was a bit more of a hike for the Austinites, so Chris & I really appreciated the effort those folks



made to come down for the day.


Chris welcomed everyone to their new spacious San Antonio facility which they moved into in November.




He described who XPEL is, what they do, how they got started and how long they've been in business. Founded in 1997, XPEL is now a worldwide company providing a myriad of automotive paint & interior protection products. XPEL is an innovative leader in Paint Protection Film (PPF). He introduced the staff that was there to do the demonstrations & summarized the demos that were planned.

The group was first shown XPEL's 'Design Access Program' which has over 80,000 patterns for nearly every vehicle model and every part that can have film applied. The film is formally called "Paint Protection Film" or "PPF". Some may also call it a "clear bra". Wrapping is the term generally used when film is applied to the exterior of the vehicle. Once the vehicle is identified and the part of the vehicle is chosen to be wrapped, the pattern is printed on a huge "printer" that cuts out the pattern on the film that will be placed on the car. The film has an adhesive that is activated by The PPF can be clear and water.

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invisible, or matte, which provides the car with a stealth look, or as BMW calls it, frozen. The PPF can be put



on any part of the car, but the most common use is on the front third, covering the front bumper, hood and quarter panels.

The first demo was of the application of the film on a brand new M340i's front bumper. It was



fascinating to watch the process of the film being applied to the car. Every cut-out is already done by the "printer", making it fairly quick work of placement on the car. Then the installer uses thick flexible squeegee-like tools in various sizes to smooth the film against the bumper, bending the edges around the bends of the bumper until it's precisely in place & fits perfectly.

The next demo was of their

ceramic paint coating. The ceramic was demonstrated on one side of a hood so that an easy comparison could be made. A ceramic coating makes the



paint incredibly slick and resistant to contaminants. It also brings out a deep shine that no amount of wax can achieve. It's especially noticeable on dark colors, but all colors benefit from the product's features of making the car easy to clean and care for. In addition to the ceramic coating, the XPEL representative demonstrated how the self-healing feature of PPF works. He took a wire brush and



scratched the surface the film. He then applied heat (mimicking the affect of the sun) and the scratches disappeared!

After a great lunch catered by Fire Wok Asian Stir Fry, attendees were introduced to XPEL's "Architectural" line of film, made for residential &

commercial purposes. The demonstration of how much heat is rejected by their 'Crystal Clear 70' film was remarkable. XPEL also offers security film which is virtually impenetrable. And the bad guys will



never know it's there until they try to break the glass and can't.

The final demo was the placement of windshield film on a donor car, which happened to be my M3. Most people do not realize that film can be placed on the inside of your windshield to help reduce UV damage and heat penetration into your car. The horizontal nature of a windshield makes it the single biggest culprit in heating up your car and damaging your interior. I was surprised by the installation process. First the film is placed on the outside of the windshield. Because of the makeup of this film, it must be heated to shrink to form with the curvature of the windshield. They like to avoid using the heat gun on the inside of the car,

so they do it on the outside. Once the film has been completely shrunk to conform and completely smoothed out, the installer cuts the shape along the dark windshield edge. The film is then is rolled up and after thoroughly cleaning and then wetting the inside of the windshield, is unrolled and adhered to the inside of the windshield. The installer then adjusts it to its proper position and squeegees any bubbles away. Just like any other



window film, it takes a couple of days for the film to cure.

I must say that I was immediately able to tell the difference. I ran a

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couple of errands on the way home & my car stayed remarkably cool. Additionally, now that I've had it on my car about a week, my car isn't so oppressively hot when I get into it after it sits in the sun. Sure, it's still pretty warm, this IS summer in Texas, but it's noticeably not as hot.

To all participants in the event, XPEL gave away a goodie mug filled with a microfiber towel, pen,



sunglasses, lip stuff and a koozie. Additionally everyone completed a raffle ticket at the end and due to time constraints, the winners were drawn &

notified the week after. The winners of the raffle were Marek Hnizda, Glenn McConnell and Bud Hajek.



Congratulations to those guys! And thank you to everyone that attended. And special thanks to Chris and his staff for a great event that I know everyone enjoyed. I know everyone left with a lot more knowledge and appreciation of XPEL's products & services.



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### BMW Namibia Multiday Tour

Sandra and I made a trip in April that we anticipated would stretch our comfort zone and likely exercise our stress muscles. As it turned out, our trip to Namibia, where we drove a new X3 in the BMW Namibia Multiday Tour was entirely comfortable (if not luxurious at times) and required little exercise of the stress muscles.

The eight-day Namibia tour has been offered by BMW South Africa for several years. I just happened to stumble across information about it online and knew that it was something I wanted to do. Driving somebody else's BMW off-road in Africa? Of course that was something I had to do.

All the cars were X3 X-drive 30d's. The cars were new; ours had fewer than 5,000 km (about 3,000 miles) on it. Namibians and South Africans drive on the left side of the road and our cars, which had been assembled in South Africa, had right-hand drive. The cars had a few upgrades:

- 20mm suspension spacers to provide a slight lift of less than an inch,
- Full body skid plates (The front bumper had been shortened to accommodate the skid plate.),
- Slightly larger non-run flat tires (Michelin Latitude Cross 225/65 R18). I don't know what the stock tire size is for an X3, but I believe these tires were a bit larger. They used non-run flats so the tires' footprint would enlarge when we aired down when we drove on the riverbeds and dunes.
- · Full-size spare, and
- A proper front tow point.

Other than those upgrades, the X3's were stock. You wouldn't want to take

them rock crawling, but they could easily handle the beaches and Forest Service roads I've taken a Jeep on.



There were 12 people in our group in six cars plus the guides' car. We decided on a brown one.

On some days we were accompanied by a Land Rover for support. The support usually consisted of carrying water and snacks, but we did take advantage of it on the sand dunes in the Namib Desert where almost all of us got stuck at least once. Some fool from Texas got stuck a couple of times, but he was having a *lot* of fun.

There are several ways to get to Namibia. We took the non-stop British Airways flight from Austin to London, then after a long layover we flew to Johannesburg (over 11 hours), and then took a two-hour flight to Windhoek, the capital of Namibia. Fares vary widely depending on the class you fly in and what sort of connection hassle you're willing to tolerate

I would say we were lucky to be with a good group of people, but it seems that most of the people we meet at BMW events make good companions, so I don't know that luck had much to do with it. One couple, from Munich, had also done the tour in 2017. They were happy to meet people from Texas because they said Germans regard people from Munich much the same way people from other

parts of the United States regard Texans – just a bit, different. There was another couple from Germany, a family of four from Singapore, and a couple from the Netherlands.

The lead instructor, Marc Nemeth, was from Munich. Another instructor, Bernie Williams, from South Africa, was along, also, and George Kaingob, from Namibia, drove the Land Rover and handled logistics, such as paying for fuel and making other arrangements on the fly as our schedule changed. Everybody spoke English and German, except us English speakers, of course, who spoke no German.



Windhoek is roughly in the center of Namibia. A driver met us at the airport and took us to the Okapuka Ranch about an hour north. From the Okapuka Ranch we would drive a sort of loop west to the Atlantic coast and then take back roads to Windhoek for our return home. I forgot to see how far we drove, but I believe it was about 1400 km or approximately 800 or so miles



Marc Nemeth, the lead instructor, briefed us on the X3's. We would be turning the traction control off at times, disabling the DSC and

TPMS as conditions dictated, and driving in manual mode (usually M2) at times. On some of the mountain roads we stayed in manual and just used the paddles to shift. We also learned about hill descent control. The Germans and Texans got a few needed lessons on driving on the left side of the road. We drove the same car for the entire week.



After our briefing we headed for the aptly named Antenna Mountain (upper left), where the X3's really showed off. I'm not sure what I expected, but I was impressed by how challenging the so-called roads were and how well the X3's performed. We saw game, mostly giraffes, right away. Scrambling up a mountain in the comfort of an X3 up close and personal with exotic game – this trip was off to a good start.



We saw plenty of game while we were driving in the mountains as well as on the game drives in Land Rovers.

The two days at Okapuka included mountain drives in the X3's on both days and a game drive where we ran into more giraffes, rhinoceros, wart hogs, oryx, ostriches, and more. From Okapuka we drove to the Erindi Game Reserve on paved and not-so-paved gravel roads. We also got some instruction on emergency stops and the passengers practiced using the emergency brake from their side of the case the driver became incapacitated. The gravel roads weren't that rough. The speed limits were usually 80-100 km/hour (about 50-60 mph), which we stayed pretty close to. The problem was that the cars were throwing up so much dust that if you were following too close, you couldn't see the dips, hazards, and oncoming traffic.

After a pre-dawn game drive (We didn't come all the way to Namibia to sleep.) and breakfast at the luxurious Old Traders Lodge where we had spent the night, we headed for the Erongo Mountains and the Ai Aiba Lodge.



We detoured onto a riverbed to get from Erindi to Erongo. Notice the X3 on the left on three wheels.



From Ai Aiba, where we had watched the sun go down and had barbecue under the stars, we headed for Swakopmund on the Atlantic coast and the first-class Strand Hotel. The drive included gravel tracks (not sure I'd call them "roads") with a stop at an abandoned copper mine, through the Khan and Swakop riverbeds.



We picked up some extra passengers on our tour of Walvis Harbour, including this seal who jumped into the boat with us and seemed to really know his way around the bay.

You never know what's going to be the highlight or most memorable part of a trip. From Swakopmund we drove south along the Atlantic coast to Walvis Bay, where we took a boat tour of Walvis Harbour to see seals and dolphins. We saw plenty of both, but what we didn't expect was that a seal would jump into the small boat with us. Some pelicans and a seagull also hitched a ride. Most of the extra passengers did disembark while we had a snack on the boat that included some extremely fresh and delicious Atlantic oysters.

The following day, Friday, was our last day behind the wheel. We drove some back roads from Swakopmund to Windhoek via the scenic Boshua Pass. In

Windhoek we stayed at the historic and luxurious Heinitzburg Hotel, had a long dinner where we exchanged pictures, and said good-bye to some of the great people we had had the pleasure to spend the week with.



Marc gave us some advice on how to drive on sand dunes and then we headed for the nearby Namib Desert. After a few hours of fun on the dunes we drove back up the coast, stopped for fuel and re-inflated the tires.

Saturday was the last day of the tour and after a few more short good-byes over breakfast we started the long trip back home.

What a great trip and what a totally different, and fun, way to experience driving a BMW! I can't recommend it highly enough.
