Z-Fest 2015 was our 3rd long Z trip, with the first being the final homecoming in 2008, and the 2nd being Z-Fest 2011 in Spartanburg. We've taken several other shorter trips, but to embark on a 4,000+ mile journey was something we really thought long & hard about. However, friends Bill & Pam Elwell, who have a house in PA toward Philly, were going, so we took the opportunity to travel with them & see their house too.

We took off early Sunday morning, July 26th with 60,565 miles on the M-ster. By July 28th we'd crossed the 62,000 mile mark. On August 7th we pulled into the driveway 8 miles short of 65,000 miles on the M-ster, with a grand total for the trip of 4, 427 miles. WOW!

First real stop of interest was Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill, south of Lexington, Kentucky on our 2nd day on the road. It is a former Shaker village of 3,000



acres that has been restored with several buildings turned into accommodations. Many Shaker traditions are still used there, and much of the food is either grown or processed there.

The 3rd day took us to Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater in Pennsylvania. Fallingwater is Frank Lloyd Wright's main masterpiece of architectural design.



Designed & built as a weekend home for the family that owned the Kaufman Department store in Pittsburgh, it was completed in 1937. Its cantilevered construction seemingly floating above the

river & the falls has remarkably stood the test of time.

Mid-afternoon on Wednesday the 29th we rolled into State College & the Penn Stater Hotel. There were already quite a number of Z's there, including Roger, who had just rolled in about an hour before us. We later met up with another Austin couple, Warren & Lisa Kodosky. Warren and Lisa were in the midst of their own remarkable journey. They put a tow bar on their Z, towed their vintage Alpha Romeo to Michigan for a antique auto tour around Lake Michigan before towing the Alpha to Pennsylvania for Z-Fest and then back home to Austin.

This year's Z-Fest had lots & lots of activities scheduled. All the fun activities began on Thursday, but so did the rain. But we all knew that once this short-lived system passed would come much cooler & drier air – a VERY welcome thing after some very oppressive humidity levels on our trip across the country. Problem was, we'd all washed our cars the night before. And we were signed up for the Wine & Chocolate Tour on Thursday. Oh well... the cars will get washed again later.

On the Wine & Chocolate tour we visited 2 wineries and received a personal tour of Asher's Chocolate Company in



Lewistown, PA. Despite my initial thoughts of the wine being what I was most interested in, the highlight turned out to be the chocolate factory tour. The wine

slushies were great, but as we were driving, we couldn't partake too much in them. But ahhh the chocolate. We got a full in-depth tour of the workings of the factory. We learned that Asher's Chocolates is the official chocolate supplier to Disney. We witnessed pretzels being coated with chocolate, and almond butter crunch being



made. They also had huge 1,500 pound boxes of 10 pound bars that are melted for production, and we saw 25 pound molded Santas. The best part was that we got samples along the way, as well as at the end of the tour. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves, some of us particularly more than others Roger.

On Thursday evening a very nice welcome reception was held at Letterman's Grill. We were served great pulled pork and many enjoyed \$2 pounders (a 16 oz beer). It was an absolutely beautiful evening, the rain was long gone, so off to the carwash...again, to get our Z's looking pretty for the rest of the weekend.

Friday we participated in the Zedkhana. Like the O'Fest Gymkhana, you must drive you car as fast & controlled as possible around little cones like an autocross, not hit any cones, perform tasks at designated locations all while following very specific exit & entry procedures from your car. This year's tasks were to remove 2 steaks from a grill to separate plates; pour "beer" into 3 beer glasses; and change the wheels on a wooden roadster from winter

to summer (or visa versa) and change the top from soft to hardtop (or visa versa). And all this is timed. Best time gets the



prize. Warren had the lead for much of the morning, but then the experienced folks hit the "track". In the end Bill Elwell tied for 4th! I didn't do too bad for a first-timer.



Poor Brad had issues with his seatbelt locking up when he tried to pull it too hard to put it back on. I crushed a cone I absolutely could not see, yet Bill, who was riding with me, and as most of you know is quite tall, warned me of – yet I ignored him. Hey! I would've hit it anyway as I couldn't even see it! Note to self – next time get something to sit on! It was loads of fun and I definitely learned some things for next time.

After the Zedkhana, a small group of us took in a drive. There were numerous drives that had been mapped out for the attendees. The roads & scenery around central Pennsylvania are just lovely. It was corn season, so all over the place are farms and corn fields, for miles and miles. It's also in Amish country, so occasionally we'd see a buggy on the road, or in one case 2 men working the field with their horse-drawn equipment. On this drive we visited a car museum – Swigart Antique Auto Museum. Although a small museum, it has quite a wonderful collection of



vintage cars, and an enormous display of vintage model cars as well.

On an absolutely beautiful Pennsylvania Saturday morning about 150 Z's lined up for that famous panoramic photo. Jay Best, the original Homecoming panoramic photographer still takes the photo and does so with a vintage camera



that uses extremely large roll film that is no longer available. But now he also does a digital back up just in case!

After another afternoon drive, the final event was the Saturday night closing and awards banquet. There are some really great honors bestowed on the hard working

volunteers that make Z-Fest happen.

On Sunday we left for Bill & Pam's place in eastern PA. They have a 1700's era farm house that they visit as often as they



can. BBQ & spaghetti dinners, a bonfire, drives around the PAAmish countryside, and more ice cream at a local creamery topped off the 2 night stay there.

Brad & I watch lots of car shows on Velocity, on one of which we learned about the Simeone Foundation Auto Museum in Philadelphia. The Simeone houses some of the most historically significant vintage race cars in the world. Since we were so close,



we decided we had to go. Disappointed we were not! Despite the horrendous Philly traffic getting to & from, we thoroughly enjoyed the museum. It's laid out essentially by race track, so grouped together are the cars that raced at those tracks.

Our next goal was to see the New River Gorge Bridge in West Virginia. At the time of completion in 1977, it was the longest single-span arch bridge in the world, as well as the highest vehicular bridge in the world. Now it's 4th & 3rd respectively. None-the-less, it's a sight to behold. The New River below is a magnet



for rafter & kayakers. But it's so far down that the full size, 8+ man rafts look like kayaks. And the kayaks are virtually impossible to see without binoculars or a good zoom lens. It's still a mystery to this day why the river is called the 'New River', as it's a very old river.

The remainder of the trip was dedicated to heading home. That is until our A/C went out before we hit Tennessee. This resulted in an early stop in Knoxville and a 'come in at 8 and we'll see what we can do' appointment at the local BMW dealer the next morning. However, I decided I'd also put a post on the ZSCCA's Facebook page if by chance there was a reputable independent shop in the area, and someone responded that there was! Turns out the shop was approximately 2 miles from the BMW dealer, which we had purposefully stayed close to for our visit the next morning. European Auto Garage (EAG) was great! Our car was back with a technician before our "appointed" time with the dealer, and we were out of there and back on the road by 11 am! What a great network there is out there!

Next year's Z-Fest is planned for Asheville, North Carolina. Start your engines, check those tires, and plan on some great drives in the NC mountains! Not to mention the wonderful drives, such as the Cherohala Skyway, Nantahala Byway and the infamous Dragon, just to name a few on the way there.

Our morning drive began in San Marcos and led us east out of town through Lockhart and past its beautiful county courthouse and then north on







Fish, steak, pasta, burgers, wraps, soups and sandwiches were all ordered, as was homemade pies and cakes for dessert. And Glenn McConnell enjoyed an additional birthday surprise treat ordered by an unknown conspirator. I think I saw Glenn blush when everyone sang Happy Birthday to him. Shakespearean form, coincidence, luck, and twists of fate played major roles in the protagonist's destiny. Several chapter members thought it was the most entertaining Shakespearean play they had ever seen. The plot definitely had more twists and turns than our morning drive

through the rural Texas landscape had offered! But the pastoral beauty of that very same landscape made up for the lack of twisties encountered.

Well, the barn where the productions are held has plenty of fans overhead and evaporative coolers on all sides help the audience remain comfortable. During the stretch of seemingly relentless triple-digit heat we endured in late July and early August, I began to fear that I would prove to have been overly optimistic in scheduling an event on and around water, with the resulting high humidity, in mid-August. But in the week leading up to the event, the heat mercifully began to drop, and RSVPs began to rise. We gathered at Cabela's in San Marcos greeted with a sunny, pleasant 85 F day, perfect for this type



of event, and after members had all found each other (not everyone had parked in the same area of that Texassized parking lot), we had a short and sweet drivers meeting and then set off, bound for the Meadows Center.

As I discovered when planning the route, options for getting to the Meadows Center from Buda on the Hill Country roads west of I-35 that I enjoy so much were few and less than ideal due to traffic and/or travel time. So instead, we crossed over I-35 exiting Cabela's and took easterly roads, primarily segments of FM 2001 and TX-21, with detours onto smaller roads throughout – including, in an unintended boost to the auto detailing industry, a brief stint on an unpaved dusty road! Toward end of

the route, we crossed over the Blanco River and worked our way back to the west side of I-35, pulling into the Meadows Center right on schedule,



where we purchased our tickets and were divided into three groups.

Corey and I were in a group that began with the glass-bottom boat tour on Spring Lake. Since the day was sunny and the ¼" glass of the boat lies below the surface of the water that is often disrupted by ripples, we were treated to crystal clear views straight to the bottom, even at its deepest point of 30 feet. Our tour guide opened with



some history of the area, explaining that it used to be the site of the first theme park in Texas, which was home to such attractions as Ralph the Swimming Pig (there were in fact many Ralphs over the lifetime of the theme park), chickens that played tic-tac-toe, and underwater mermaid and water dancing

performances that audiences viewed from submarines! Unfortunately, a flood eventually damaged the area too extensively for it to continue as the site of a theme park, so in 1996 it was sold to Texas State University, which now uses it primarily as a base for academic research and educating the public. Prospective researchers can take required scuba diving lessons right at Spring Lake, and recent underwater excavations have uncovered artifacts dating back 12,000 years, with no gaps, indicating that inhabitants never left the area for any appreciable period of time, likely due to the constant supply of fresh This makes Spring Lake the



longest continuously inhabited area in what we now know as Texas. The area does still serves some purely recreational purposes, however, including serving as the starting point for the Texas Water Safari, billed as the world's toughest canoe race. In this absolutely grueling challenge, teams of competitors paddle to the shrimping village of Seadrift on the Gulf of Mexico, 260 miles away – in just 100 hours. What a feat!

Spring Lake is fed from springs that rise up out of the sand at the bottom of the lake, and indeed we saw several such areas where sand was bubbling up. The pressure at certain inlets is strong enough to push an adult human back several feet, a discovery made by Johnny Wisemiller (the original Tarzan) when he swam down to try to drink from one!



This pressure combined with the sheer quantity of inlets means that the water in Spring Lake "turns over" (i.e. is completely replaced) three to five times per day! It enters Spring Lake at a constant 72 degrees year-round due to geothermal warming, and the rapid turnover means that the entire lake itself remains at a constant 72 degrees year-



round since no single sample of water remains in the lake long enough for its temperature to be influenced significantly by the ambient air temperature. Spring Lake also lies atop a fault line, which is currently dormant but which long ago was responsible for forming the Edwards Aquifer and Texas Hill Country!

and informative boat tour, our guide took us through the wetlands. The



composition of wetlands soil is completely different from that found on dry land, and consequently different species of plant life are found there. The water level varies throughout the year, which causes some of the wildlife at the Meadows Center to migrate between Spring Lake and the wetlands accordingly. Our particularly memorable such species is the spotted gar, a fish that can not only breathe by gulping air from the surface when the water level drops too low, but can sneak up on smaller fish and swallow them whole thanks to its very long snout that



brandishes a whopping 700 teeth! In addition to serving as a source of food

and shelter for wildlife that live in and around the water, the wetlands control and flooding, erosion recharge underground water supplies, and clean polluted water. It is worrisome, then, that wetlands throughout North America are endangered, having been drained by for farming, humans development, and mining, or otherwise damaged by chemical pollution and introduction of foreign predatory species. This in turn threatens the species indigenous to the wetlands, and indeed many species living in the Edwards Aquifer and San Marcos River appear on the threatened or even endangered species lists.

We left the Meadows Center with a renewed appreciation for the beautiful and fascinating nature we are so lucky to have close to home, as well as the importance of preserving it for generations to come. Having worked up a healthy appetite by this time, after a drive of just a few blocks we descended on Mamacita's, where a private dining area had been prepared for



us. Before long, we were enjoying a delicious and filling meal of fajitas served banquet style, naturally with a side of wonderful company and conversation. Many thanks to all who attended and made it such a successful event, and for those who were unable to attend, we hope to see you next month at our Fun Rally!

For various reasons we didn't have family vacations planned this summer, and because we're always looking for free t-shirts that actually have a high hidden cost, Carl and I searched for road trips. We quickly discovered the Drive 4 Corners event

Self described as the premier summer event by the Denver chapter of our BMW CCA, it's based in Pagosa Springs Colorado and this year was held on Friday August 7 to Sunday August 9. The dates were good for us, our wives were amenable (that's a big deal), and I had never been to Colorado, so off we go.

Thursday, Day One

The straightest route there from Austin is Lampasas, Abilene, Lubbock, Clovis, Santa Fe, Pagosa Springs, just under 900 miles. Hitting the road around 0930, we made good time on our West Texas roads with favorable weather conditions. We stopped for the night after about 650 miles at a motel in Moriarity New Mexico on Route 66. Republican presidential debate was held that night and with our acute sense of civic duty (possibly misapplied in this case), we stopped early to catch it on TV. After the photo shot most of us went on the extended drive that generally



headed north. Lunch was at a small restaurant in Creede, another beautiful mountain valley, a little higher up at 9,500 feet according to my GPS. We followed a well-driven X3, got passed by a few well-driven M3s and M5s (this can happen). After lunch we continued north to Lake City, crossing the Continental Divide, and maxed out at 11,558 feet of elevation according to my GPS. Ludwig was a little slower in this thin air, and candidly so was



I. I now better understand why some elite athletes train at altitude.

Back to our motel, where most of us stayed. Dinner was well attended, held there under a tent specially set up for us



with BBQ pork, baked beans and coleslaw. We had a local band playing, with more cars to inspect, and lots of raffle items after that. I for one slept well that night. Sunday, Day 4

With no driving events scheduled, Carl and I strayed off the reservation. First we did 18 holes at the only golf course in town. It's well maintained and I'm guessing it has a short season. Gorgeous day with a high temperature around 80 and not a cloud in sight.

It turns out that Pagosa Springs is a geothermal hot spot. Hot springs bubble up at 170 degrees and need to be cooled before we can use it. There are three resorts there that specialize in hot baths/spa/massage, etc. We choose The Overlook, a short block from our hotel. They have a hot tub on the roof, in the



shade, with a view that can't be beat. After three hours and several adult beverages, we were ready for dinner.

Happily, there were quite a few Bimmerheads still at our motel, so we stayed up late sipping Scotch and trading war stories. Tough day, but someone has to do this, right?

Monday, Day Five

An early start, beginning at the local car parts store that opened at 0800. The warning light for a burned out left front low beam headlight popped up on Sunday. We would have preferred to address this right away but the two car part stores in Pagosa Springs were both closed on Sunday. Normally replacing a head light bulb is an easy task, however BMW, in typical German manner, has managed to over-engineer this. Carl The Mechanic eagerly approached the job. My job was to stay out of the way. The executive summary is that you start in the engine bay, move to the wheel well, and then back to the engine bay. An hour and \$16.02 later, we're on the road. We belatedly thank our parents for his electrical engineering education.

Just to be different, we chose an alternative route home that was slightly longer. 160 miles south to Santa Fe and



then we picked up US 285. This highway runs pretty much straight south through Roswell, Carlsbad, Pecos, and Fort Stockton. It's four lanes most of the time, straight (we could see to the horizon on several occasions) and mostly flat. We drove through Area 51 north of Roswell, looking for UFOs. Alas, we spotted none, although we did occasionally spot a cow

or oilrig. I think we saw a tree, once. Empty road, we turned on the cruise control and settled in with the radar detector keeping us protected. A Valentine One is an indispensible piece of road trip hardware. Somewhere on this stretch, we hit a swarm (flock, herd, group, passel?) of really large grasshoppers. I don't think



I've ever seen a car with more bugs plastered to the front. At the next gas stop it took us a solid 20 minutes to get debugged.

South of Carlsbad the oil patch begins, traffic increases with mostly oversized pick-ups and road conditions decrease. I now have a rock chip in the windshield to prove it. Deep sigh.

Continuing southeast, we pass through Pecos and pick up I-10 in Fort Stockton. This is pretty much the only Interstate highway we use the entire trip. The speed limit is 80, the road is in good condition, with very light traffic. Suffice it to say that modern BMWs are marvelous high-speed long distance cars. After 219 miles we leave I-10 west of Fredericksburg for Highway 290 and a straight shot to Austin.

After dropping Carl at home, I'm at my place at 0139, about 950 miles from where we started the day in Pagosa Springs. Interestingly, it was 48 degrees when we woke up in Colorado, peaked at 106 degrees in West Texas.


